



The entire Senior Class is on the staff, and with the aid of some underclassmen


and our advisors we have produced this book.

Since this edition of Re-Echo is the largest ever, it proved a tremendous task to get the book ready for press. Through the cooperation of the staff and Art Club we succeeded in our purpose and are proud of our accomplishment. We have obtained many more ads than ever before and we thank those who worked so diligently in this purpose to make the book self supporting. A snapshot campaign was carried on for the book and also a race for subscriptions among the classes. Both schemes helped make our subscriptions soar.

Board of Education

The main purpose of the Board of Education is to further the interest of L. C. S. to the best of their judgment and ability.

The outstanding project this year was the promotion of a building program, which culminated in a favorable district vote for the construction of a new grade


school. For safety measures, adjacent property was also acquired.

The Board members serve on various committees for the purpose of better carrying out their work. The Transportation Committee consists of Lewis Rowley, Lloyd Valentine and Leland Hutchison; its purpose is to arrange bus schedules, make recommendations for the purchase of new buses, sanction all repairs of transportation facilities and make recommendations for bus drivers. The Teachers Committee, made up of Leland Hutchison, Lewis Rowley and Floyd Jones, acts in an advisory capacity to the Board in matters relating to the teachers' salaries, and all other matters concerning relationship between the teachers and the Board of Education. Another group is the Athletic Committee, which consists of Leonard Oakes, Clayton Smith and Lewis Rowley; their purpose is to supervise athletics in the school in conjunction with the Principal and Coach, recommend purchases of athletic equipment and make improvements of the athletic field. Arthur Donald, Clayton Smith and Floyd Jones serve on the Repairs Committee, which has complete charge of the repairs and upkeep of all buildings connected with the school. Last, but not least, is the Purchasing Committee, comprised of Harold Patterson, Leonard Oakes, and Leland Hutchison. This group has charge of receiving bids on all major school equipment, such as cafeteria equipment, blackboards, etc.

One of the Board members, Lewis Rowley, is the Vice-President of the Niagara-Orleans School Boards Association. Mr. Rowley is also a representative from Region 2, District 1, on the Central School Boards Committee for Educational Research. The purpose of this committee is to seek methods for the improvement of central

school districts.

It is through the work of the Board of Education that we are able to enjoy school as we do. Without question, these men are our sponsors.

one points.




We completed our year of intramurals by playing baseball. Once again this


