The outstanding project, the building of the new elementary scheol, has taken much work over a period of time on the part of the board. First, the building program had to be passed by the voters of the district. Seemingly, much worry and hard work would stop there, but the next item was to get shipments of materials needed in the construction. Against all these odds, the board emerged victorious!

The board's regular work has been put in charge of five committees. First, there was the Transportation Committee which arranged bus schedules, and handled all matter falling into this category. The Teachers' Committee handled affairs concerning the teachers and the board. The committee which supervised athletics, parchased equipment and made improvements on the athletic field was, of course, the Athletic Committee. Likewise, the Repairs Committee had complete charge of repair and maintenance of all school buildings. The group in charge of receiving bids on major equipment was the Purchasing and Financing Committee. These five committees worked together to make a smoothly rumning school and a harmoniously functioning board.
