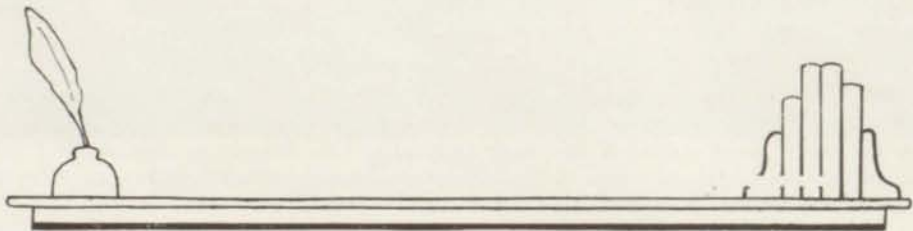

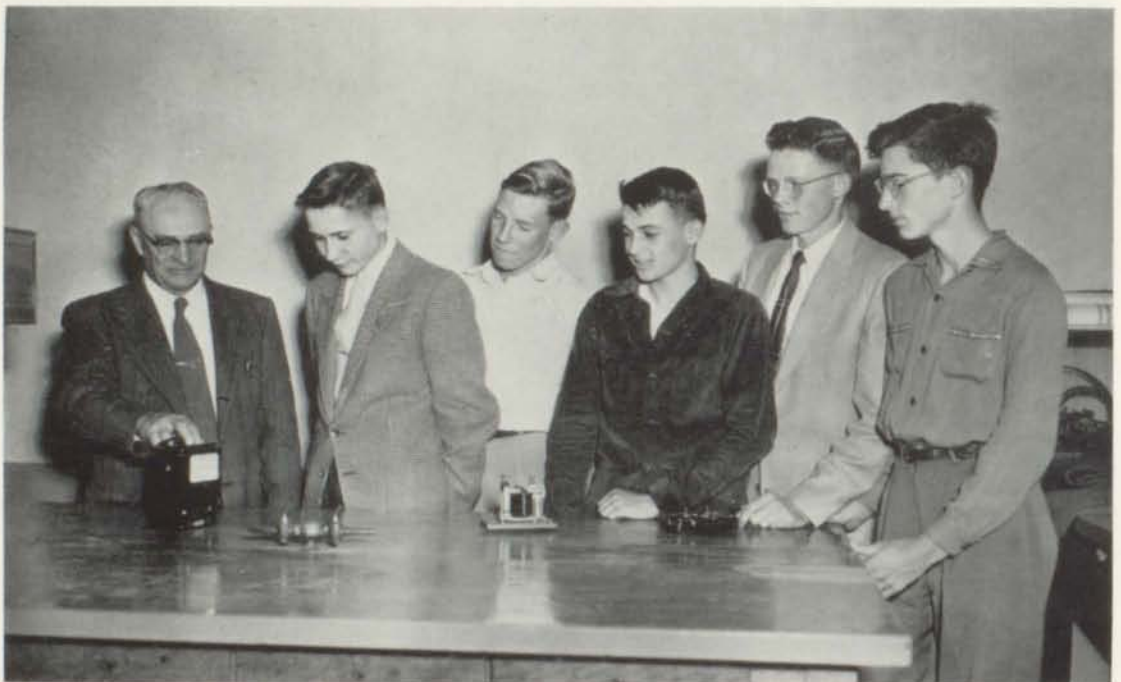
As spring walked in the door, the members studied a small, yet interesting aspect of biology. Field trips after school proved educational and increased their knowledge of plant and animal life.

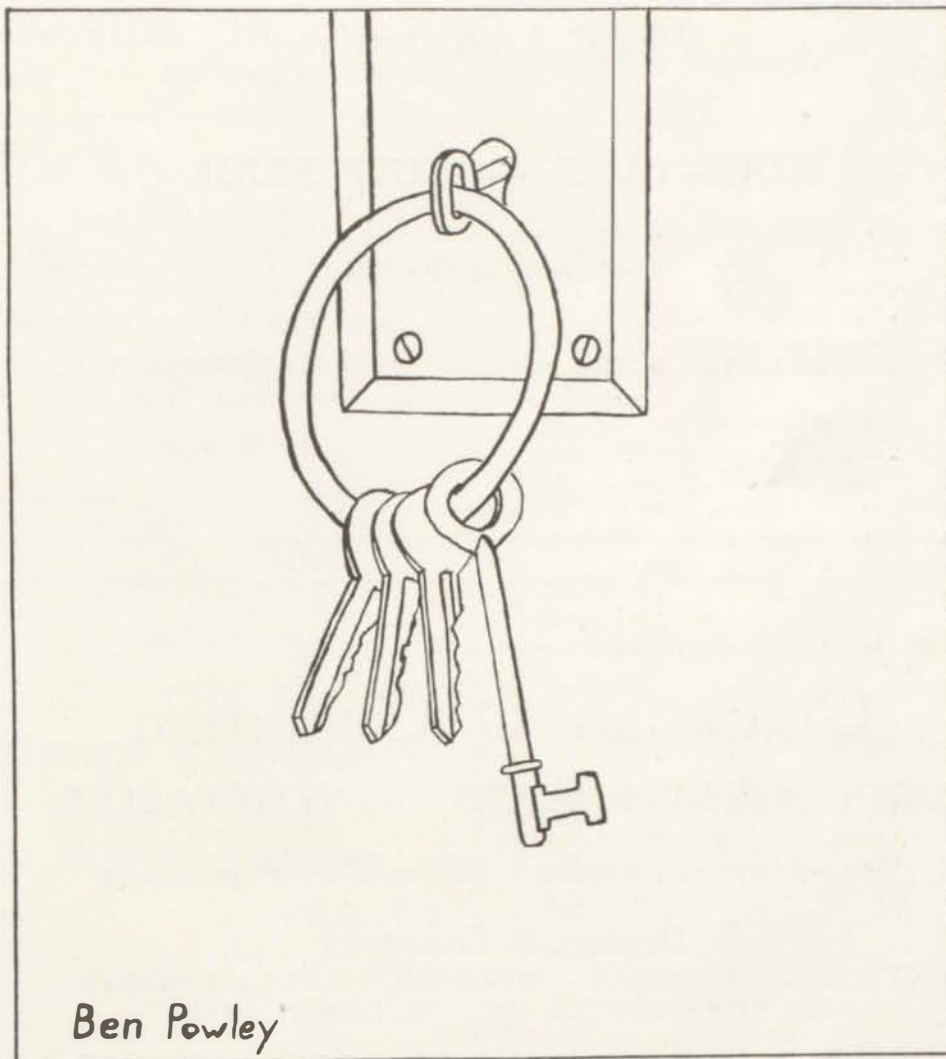
