Robert Nuchow joined the dass in the fourth week and we progressed under the able guidance of Miss Lucille Artlip that sear.

As we climbed the second step in high school we were under the leadership of Jean Ames-president. Carlton Plummer-vice president. Noralu Wexodworthsecretary, and Carol Plummer-treasurer. Robert Muchow and Carton Plummer were our Student Council representatives.

By our eleventh year we became dimly aware that we were completing our high school education. As a class, with president Jeffrey Smythe, we defeated the Seniors in the amnal fund raising drive for CVRE; and then refused to buy soft drinks for them at the Junior-Senior pienic. That year we lost Ciloria Beales, and Norval Everts went on to graduate. Mr. Dilcher and Mrs. Bradley, our adsisors, did their best to discourage us in the idea that we should be first in the lunch line as well as everything else.

Some of the Juniors crossed the boards for the first time this year in the benior Play, "The Nervous Wreck". We sold candy, presented the amnual Junior Prom, sold Christmas cards and sold refreshments at bashetball, football, and baseball games, put on suppers and all the other fund raising projects that we could think of. The King and Queen of our magnificent Junior Prom were Jeffrey Smythe and Bail fohnson. The decorations were made spectaculan with the aid of the "man on the flying trapeece" who fell "in the line of duty" two dats before the Prom.

We started our Senior year off with a bang, with the amnal Senior Play. "The Cammal Queen". This year there was the last minute rush as many of our class members filed applications for college. With our class advisors and Mrs. Warner. our home rexom teacher, trying to chech our enthusiasm, we set out on a rash of projects: supper, selling taffy, dances, selling yearbook advertisements and other sundry activities.
