# CLASS HISTORY

They are Keith Bane, Richard Fisk, Robert Harrold, Lawrence Pratt, Lawrence Sanderson, Randall Bane, Jereld Cooper, Mary Byerly, Margo Cooper, Sue Hey, Virginia Hoffman, Joyce Huntington, Diane Johnson, Joyce Martin, Pamela Postle, Nancy Pritchard, Carolyn Rowley, and Dianne Zanow.

Our first year successfully completed, we were promoted to the first grade to be guided by Miss Lucille Artlip. As we looked around we noticed that John Sawyer, William Willis and Cynthia Krenning had been added to our roll. Of this year we recall most vividly "those trips to the closet".

Moving ever forward we found the necessity to divide our growing class into two sections for our second grade year. Our teachers this year were Mrs. Etta Miller and Mrs. Harriet Schnackel. New members this year included Edward Costich and Mildred Dix.

The following year Mrs. Lillian Peters and Miss Elinore Patten greeted forty-four students as we now became third graders. Looking back we remember the happy times spent "galloping" behind the Town Hall, where we passed the year because of a shortage of facilities. John Bucolo, David McCargar and Laura Palmer joined us this year.

On we went to the fourth grade to be under the guidance of Miss Helen Lienhart and Miss Ann Dooley. This year half our class was back in the same brick school house we had known as kindergarten, and the other half was in the Methodist Church. Roger Pritchard and Shirley Fitchlee were added to our number as we pressed onward to our intended goal, which at this time seemed so distant.



Coach - - - Mr. Argana


