We, the ECHO staff of 1977, after much deliberation elected to feature the 1927 yearbook and, in so doing, the class of that year. Fifty years ago was published the first of a succession of yearbooks. The 1927 Echo had much to disclose of that period. As the pages were turned the past began to unfold; the students of that time seemed not so very different from the students of this. Some essential differences, however, are the necessity and the availability of an education today as contrasted with fifty years ago.

Entering the ninth grade in 1923 were 43 students. As the years passed many students dropped out because there was little money, work needed to be done at home, or an education just didn't seem so important. In their final year, those graduating numbered only 19. With such a small class, a good part of the yearbook was dedicated to various pieces of
writing. Sections of the publication include the History of the Class, the Class Prophecy, and the Senior Will. The only clubs at this time were the Athletic Association and the Dramatic Club. Both Clubs worked together to produce the operetta "Bits O' Blarney", and the Dramatic Club performed the play "For One Night Only". The Athletic Association consisted of boys playing the only interscholastic sports of basketball and baseball. Although it was their initial year of competition the teams won the majority of their games. An activity for the entire class was the Senior Trip to Washington D.C. during Easter vacation.

What was most impressive was the very personal aspect of the book. Its warmth and closeness showed the widespread feeling of Lyndonville as it was fifty years ago and as it is today.
