Audrey II was actually a giant puppet manipulated by Todd Riemer. Todd sat inside the puppet and controlled its roots with his feet and its mouth with his arms.






YOUNG TEAM SHOWS ITS METTLE


That training and preparation produced another fine year for Tiger grapplers, for after coming off a fantastic sectional title last year, Lyndonville posted a solid 9-4 season this year.
